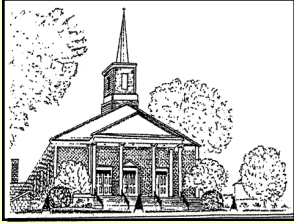
Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem.

A Note From Our Pastor

My Dear Parishioners,

This week we celebrate the 3rd Sunday of Lent and our Lord turns over the tables of the money changers and shows us what righteous anger looks like. At the Pass-over, the Temple became a shopping mall. Merchants were selling animals for the sacrifice; money changers were there trading currency at predictably exorbitant rates of exchange. When Jesus saw this, anger rose within Him. Maybe we have seen some paintings of this scene. Jesus holds a whip, poised to strike. All around Him is confusion. Merchants are holding up their arms to protect themselves. Tables are turned over. Animals are running away. Coins are spilled all over the place. Bystanders are dashing for cover. What does it all mean? Some say it is an instance of Jesus' righteous anger and it teaches that there is such a thing as righteous anger when we see something that is wrong. Others say that Jesus' cleansing of the Temple was a prophecy of the cleansing He would bring to the human race. But John and the disciples remembered it as the fulfillment of prophecy that the Messiah would purify the Temple.

The Temple needed radical cleaning at that moment and, once in a while, so do our lives. That's what Lent is for. Our lives need cleaning just like our homes and offices do. With the passage of time, excess baggage, useless junk and dust balls tend to accumulate. We can see that in our closet. Most closets are alike. There was a day when they were neat. Then we added some extra coat hangers, put presents there that we didn't care for, stored old boxes in them, hid items we thought we would throw out later.

Do not forget to seek Christ and to recognize His presence in the Church, which is like the continuation of His saving action in time and space. It is in the Church and through Her that Jesus continues to make Himself visible today and to allow humanity to come to Him. In our Parish and community, be welcoming to one another in order to build communion among yourselves. This is the visible sign of the presence of Christ in the Church, in spite of being so often blurred by human sin.

Lent, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

At every Mass, we are familiar with seeing the red book, called the Missal, used by the priest to celebrate Mass. This is one of the liturgical books alongside the Lectionary which contains all the scriptural readings. Another liturgical book which is less familiar is called the Gradual. This book contains all of the liturgical music published by the Vatican to be sung during the Mass. The music in this book contains what are called the Propers, that is, the sung scriptural texts sung during the Entrance, the Offertory, and Communion (proper or unique to each Mass), as well as what is called the Ordinary: the Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei (what is ordinary or the same for each Mass).

It is perhaps surprising to some Catholics that even though the Church permits the Mass to be celebrated entirely in vernacular languages, She still encourages Latin to be used in the Mass *alongside* the vernacular. In fact, Vatican II states that “Particular law remaining in force, the use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites” (*Sacrosanctum Concilium*, paragraph 36). The same document goes further, stating that “steps should be taken so that the faithful may also be able to say or to sing together in Latin those parts of the Ordinary of the Mass which pertain to them.” (SC. Para. 54)

Eleven years later, in 1974, the *Jubilate Deo* chants were published by the Sacred Congregation for Divine Worship and given to every bishop throughout the world to provide what was called “the minimum repertoire of Gregorian chants” to be sung in every parish church and cathedral of the Roman Rite. These chants were given “in response to a desire which the Holy Father had frequently expressed, that all the faithful should know at least some Latin Gregorian chants, such as, for example, the “*Gloria*”, the “*Credo*”, the “*Sanctus*”, and the “*Agnus Dei*.” (The “Kyrie” is Greek, not Latin).

During our celebration of Lent this year, we will be seeking to implement a part of this vision of Vatican II by singing the Sanctus, Memorial Acclamation, and Agnus Dei in Latin at all our weekend Masses. Even if the Latin is unfamiliar (or even if you personally dislike it for your own reasons), I invite you to open your hearts and minds to these beautiful and sacred texts. With time, these chants will become easier and more familiar. The style of chant may seem strange and different than other kinds of music but therein lies the key to its sacredness – it is a musical style set apart for divine worship! In fact, the Church’s tradition of Gregorian chant descends from the tradition of Jewish chanting in the Temple of Jerusalem. The chants we will be singing have been sung by generations of saints and some of these chant hymns have even been written by saints!

I hope you will be open to learning and singing these beautiful and sacred chants and that you allow them to lift up your hearts and voices in the praise of God at Mass. The Gloria is too joyful for this penitential season so it is absent from the Lenten Masses. It is, however, used on feast days, which are few.

The Alleluia

The absence of the Alleluia, which is a sign of our exile from our heavenly home, continues from Septuagesima until the glorious Easter Vigil.

Organ and Flowers

In order to create an atmosphere proper to the season, the Altar is not decorated with flowers. Additionally, the organ is not to be used unless it is necessary. However, on Lætare Sunday and on feasts, these restrictions are lifted

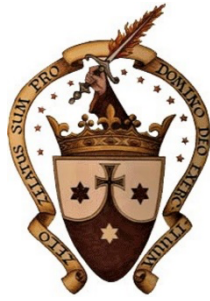
Proper Masses and Preface

Each day of Lent has a "Proper Mass" assigned to it. These Proper Masses have unique prayers, readings and chants. For most of Lent, the Lenten Preface is used. This Preface focuses on the fruits caused by God in us through the fasting (or works of penance) we have undertaken: the curbing of vices, the lifting up of the mind, and the bestowal of strength and rewards.

The Carmelite Corner

TEMPUS QUADRAGESIMÆ HEBDOMADA TERTIA – LENT III

V. Praised be Jesus Christ...

R. Now and forever!

*Óculi mei semper ad Dóminum,
quia ipse evéllit de láqueo pedes meos:
réspecte in me, et miserére mei,
quóniam únicus et pauper sum ego.*

**My eyes are ever towards the Lord:
for He shall pluck my feet out of the snare:
look Thou upon me, and have mercy on me:
for I am alone and poor.
[Ps 24: 6, 3, 22]**

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, the third Sunday of Lent presents us this reading from Ephesians, part of the cycle of readings continuing with practical instructions as to how the members of the Church should conduct themselves, especially avoiding fornication. As we saw last week, Christ is the Bridegroom, and the Church is the Bride – we are to be faithful to the Bridegroom. So, in a sense, any sin is adultery of the Christian soul against God [viz., fornication]. Anything foolish or perverse disqualifies admission into the Kingdom of God. To walk as a child of the light is to put all human sins and foibles aside, including jealousy.

Fr. Pablo Gadenz, a priest of the Diocese of Trenton, has written a wonderful commentary on the Gospel of St. Luke; he says that this passage emphasizes that God's Kingdom overcomes Satan's kingdom. Also, there are two objections to Jesus that are raised: 1. Thinking that Jesus is driving out demons in the name of Beelzebul [the evil one], and 2. Jesus is being tested [again]. Many marveled at this exorcism by Jesus, but in the background, the jealousy of the Pharisees is demonstrated in the hard opposition to Jesus. As in so many cases, Jesus turns the tables them – people of ill-will try to trip Him up, and, instead, he silences them by placing them in an untenable position. Either Jesus is performing good works by the power of God, or the Pharisees perform good works in cooperation with the devil.

St. Teresa Benedicta a Cruce [= *Teresa blessed of the Cross*; Edith Stein, Martyr of Auschwitz] made the tortuous journey from Judaism to intellectual atheism to the truth of Catholicism; and then to the summit of Mt. Carmel through the knowing and willing sacrifice of her life. This Carmelite nun was a brilliant woman who used her brilliance to corroborate human experience with the call of the divine – particularly in alliance with Christ crucified. Human suffering works for our own salvation and that of the whole world, and the Cross expiates our sins – with no cross, there is no crown. Through our observance of Lent, let us study of meaning of the Cross of Jesus Christ; once we understand the inestimable value of it, let us embrace the cross, as did Edith Stein – taking any suffering or difficulty and cooperate with the grace of God to lead to the conversion of souls [first our own, and then that of others], for we all share in the universal call to holiness and evangelization. To Jesus Christ be all glory!

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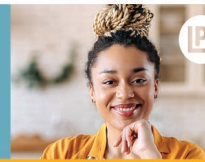
